

St. Elizabeth students enjoyed a night of physical activity and fun while supporting a good cause by participating in Think-fast 2023. The annual event, which runs every year in May, supports the students of St. Gaspar's Primary School in Tanzania. St. Elizabeth has supported these students since elementary school, and continues to fund their post-secondary education as they study to become doctors, engineers, and translators, among other pursuits.

This year's Thinkfast, which was organized by the Global Culture Club (GCC) and led by English teachers Mr. and Ms. Chu Morrison, took place on May 4 from the end of the school day until 9 pm. A minimum donation of \$45 was required to enter, with all proceeds going toward the university education of St. Gaspar's students. The evening began with a walk around the school track. Each participant completed ten laps to simulate the distance people in Tanzania


need to walk to fetch water from a river; these laps were tracked on a passport bearing the faces of the students Thinkfast supports. After a break for dinner, participants returned to the school chapel, where they learned about the issues facing Tanzanian students from Ms. Chu Morrison and even got to hear from some of the students themselves. Following the presentation, participants split up into groups and rotated through five stations, each focused on a specific UN Sustainable Development Goal: No Poverty, Good Health and Well-Being, Quality Education, Climate Action, and Gender Equity. After a brief presentation on each development goal, students participated in fun activities such as drawing, musical chairs, and surveys that gave practical examples of each goal.


Approximately 72 students attended the event, and \$4250 was raised to support the Tanzanian students. That number makes GCC member and Thinkfast station leader Ayshane Aviles proud. "The fact that I could make a difference



Man-up: What it means to be a real man

On April 21, 2023, Aubrey Noronha delivered a powerful message to a group of Grade 9 boys about what it means to be a real "man." Noronha emphasized that being a leader and a role model is not about power or dominance, but rather about compassion, empathy, and respect. He highlighted the importance of being accountable for one's actions and owning up to mistakes, as well as the significance of being a positive influence on those around you. Noronha's speech was a reminder that the boys in the audience are the future leaders of our world and that they have a responsibility to lead with integrity and empathy.

Noronha's visit was a valuable opportunity for these young boys to hear from a role model who embodies the qualities of a true leader, and it will undoubtedly have a lasting impact on their lives and the lives of those around them. Noronha's speech was a powerful reminder that being a leader and a real "man" means taking action to help others, even when it requires sacrifice. He shared stories of young people like William Kamkwamba, who built a windmill to bring electricity to his village in Kenya to show the acts of generosity we should be showing towards one another. Noronha also highlighted the bravery of soldiers like Private First Class Ross A. McGinnis, who jumped on a grenade to save his comrades, and the resourcefulness of individuals like a man who saved people from a hurricane by using a mattress as a makeshift raft. Noronha spoke of a recent incident where a girl's life was saved by a friend who recognized the warning signs and immediately got law enforcement involved to do a wellness check. These stories served as powerful examples of the courage, compassion, and selflessness that are at the core of being a "real man".

As two girls going to watch this presentation, we were really happy to know that our school community is trying to encourage young boys to learn how to properly act and treat others. The messages taught during this presentation strongly resonated with our own personal beliefs and values. We were very happy to see the emphasis of teaching boys how important it is to be authentic and show integrity, rather than feeling the need to fit into the pressures of society to appear "cool", even at the expense of hurting others.

Throughout the presentation the speaker emphasized the importance of recognizing and valuing emotions not only within oneself but also with others around them. The talk of having open communication, fostering healthy relationships, and resolving issues peacefully, installed a sense of rewarded hope for our future generation. We also thought that highlighting the points around typical stereotypes around masculinity was crucial for these young boys to hear. Encouraging these boys to embrace their vulnerability and express their emotions authentically and teaching them that it's not a sign of weakness, but rather a strength and a great quality that should be shown through each of us.

Leaving the presentation we felt immense gratitude to be a part of a community that recognized the importance of educating and empowering young boys to become compassionate and considerate individuals.



Environmentally Friendly Salt





York Region Science and Technology Fair

On April 1st, 2023, grade 11 students Kaitlyn Hsieh and Stephanie Koth entered the York Region Science and Technology Fair with their project titled "Rock-Solid Solution: Environmentally Safe Road De-Icing Using Thermal Properties of Rocks". Their rationale was the following: Cities have been using salt to melt ice on roads for years, which has caused significant harm to the environment and ecosystems around them. We discovered a salt substitute that offers the same advantages as salt while still being environmentally friendly. In order to determine the thermal characteristics and environmental effects, we investigated four different types of rocks: granite, dolomite, limestone, and soapstone. Because salt is killing animals, polluting our water supplies, and making soil infertile, it is imperative that we cease using it.

































Interview May 13, 2023 By Brayden Murray

What was your experience growing up and participating in the arts? Are there groups, clubs, or programs that you were involved in that guided you to achieving your success?

St. Elizabeth was certainly the most art-orientated training I had up to being in high school. I had participated in community theatre productions like The Sound of Music and Oliver! as well as some musical theatre competitions, but entering St. Ez was a totally different ball game. Being surrounded by such talented young artists who were excelling in their disciplines was such an inspiration for me. I was taking the Regional Arts bus in from Aurora every morning, getting picked up at 6:55am, and stayed after school for councils and rehearsals, then was on two Viva buses home. Looking back, it was being around the energy and observing the talents of my peers that made this schedule so incredibly worth it. It certainly was consuming but set the foundation for my work and support system in the arts. To this day, learning from those around you, sharing your appreciation for your peers' talents, applying feedback from your instructors, and being dedicated to leveling up your potential is key!

How did your time at St. Elizabeth shape you as a person as well as an artist? Do you have any significant memories during your time here?

I remember in Grade 9, our Student Council President saying you will remember what you get involved with extracurriculars more than your classes, so get involved. I can't emphasize this enough. Whether you're into the arts or sports or leadership or math or don't even know yet, try something new and get involved! Running for Grade 9 representative on Student Council really was the catalyst for my high school trajectory. Putting myself out there in a completely new community where I knew nobody in my grade then being given the chance to represent the freshmen's voice with the older students was a huge confidence booster. I learned so much in Grade 9 from observation particularly with how students were able to collaborate with the teachers. When talking to my friends at home, who attended other high schools, about how my teachers were always staying after school to help plan events, rehearse, coach, coordinate, travel etc. it seemed so foreign to them. Their investment has been the backbone for my dedication to stay in this field and attempt to make my community proud. From Student Council to Choir to the Musicals, Sears Drama and so much more, the student-teacher relationships continue to be some of the most cherished connections of my life.

Can you explain the initial interest and audition process that led you to playing the lead in The Musical Rock of Ages? What was your reaction to finding out that you achieved the leading role?

It is such a great feeling to see students years after they have graduated come back to visit or see them in my everyday activities outside of school and reach out to me to talk about the positive impact I had in their lives. I often receive letters from students expressing their gratitude for encouraging, supporting and seeing them as a partner in education.

Be a lifelong learner. Never stop learning and never give up. Embrace change. Teaching looks nothing like it did when I was in high school. It is by being a life long learner that you will be able to incorporate new tools and strategies into the learning process to boost student learning development.
